ESA Talk, Hall of Fame Inductees, Special Alum Presentation were Among Activities

The Lion roared loudly and proudly in celebration of the 80th anniversary of North Dakota Alpha Chapter at its 2003 annual Founders Day banquet in March.

The chapter was honored with an address by the national fraternity’s Eminent Supreme Archon, two alums were inducted into the Chapter Hall of Fame, a special gift presentation was made by a 1965 alum, and undergraduate winners of awards and scholarships were recognized. NDAL was founded in 1923, and the 2003 Founders Day banquet festivities were befitting of the eight special decades of our long and enduring local brotherhood.

The first visit to the chapter in its history by an Eminent Supreme Archon included Brother Richard Hopple’s keynote address at the banquet. He is an attorney in Cincinnati, Ohio. He spoke about the True Gentleman Initiative and how SAE was returning to its roots with an emphasis on good conduct, good scholarship, and good community service.

Hall of Fame Inductees

Chapter Hall of Fame inductees were Glenn Spitzer, ’70, and James Blakeway, ’83.

Brother Spitzer, from Ashley, ND, began his career as a manager with Borg Warner Acceptance from 1971 to 1976, then with Litton Microwave Industries in a similar position from 1976 to 1984. Now retired, he concluded his career with Katun Corporation of Minneapolis from 1984 to 2002 as vice president. Katun is the world’s leading aftermarket distributor of select products for office equipment. He and his family moved last spring from Maple Grove, MN, to Amery, WS.

Brother Blakeway, from Fargo, ND, is founder, president, and CEO of Blakeway Worldwide Panoramas, Inc., of Eden Prairie, MN. His business is the largest international publisher of skyline and panorama prints of U.S. and world

cities, historic landmarks, major golf courses, race tracks, and other athletic venues. After graduation he served in several marketing positions for Procter & Gamble for five years before embarking on his quest that would lead to his own global business ownership. After his Procter & Gamble stint, the path leading to eventual ownership of his own unique enterprise started in Australia, moved to a garage and the trunk of a car in California, and went as a fast-growing business to Minneapolis in 1991.

The Hall of Fame of the North Dakota Alpha Chapter of SAE was established in the mid-1990's to recognize career and personal achievements and service to community by alumni and to acknowledge their support of the Chapter. A display case that features perpetual plaques for each inductee and

accompanying narrative descriptions about each is featured on the Wall of Honor in the Chapter House. With the addition of the year 2003 inductees, there are 22 members in the Hall of Fame.

Alum Lion Presentation

The special presentation at the Founders Day banquet was a personal creation of 1965 alumnus Jim Penwarden. It is a 16" x 20", framed copy of his colored pastel rendering art piece of the head of a full-maned lion which he "drew" as a twelve year-old. Brother Penwarden remarked at the presentation that when he made the work way back then, it must have been a foregone matter that he would eventually become a member of SAE fraternity which has the proud lion as one of its symbols. He said he had intended for years to frame and present the work to the Chapter and now has gotten around to that.

The artwork, which hangs in the Chapter House, includes this inscription: "To North Dakota Alpha Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, *With Memories*

of a Roaring Good Time, 1962-1965; Presented at SAE Founders Day Celebration, March 2003; From James F. Penwarden, UND and N.D. Alpha, 1965."
